(a) SUMMARY OF OUR OPERATION :

During this period the Battalion supported the Third Infantry Division with direct fire, on the assault and breaching of the SIEGFRIED LINE, the crossing of the RHINE RIVER and the pursuit of the enemy, into greater GERMANY. On 14 March 1945 the Battalion moved from its training area with the Division to a position in the vicinity of ETTING (Q593485) from which to begin the new offensive. On 15 March 1945 each company moved with its respective Regiment to a forward assembly area in precaration for the attack on the SIEGFRIED LINE: "A" Company with the 7th In-"B" Company with the 15th Infantry Regiment; fantry Regiment; "C" Com any with the 30th Infantry Regiment and Recommaissance Company with the 50th Infantry Regiment. During the first day of this offensive the Battalion was held up considerably by extensive fields of non-metallic mines. Three destroyers of the Battalion were disabled by mines on roads that had previously been reported cleared by the Engineers. However, once these mine balts had been crossed the destroyers were able to give the Infantry close support at all times. During the assault on the SIEGPRIED LINE the destroyers supported the Infantry with close-in direct fire on pillboxes, machine gun nests, and gun emplacements. Many small pillboxes and machine gun emplacements were completely destroyed by this devastating fire; although the 90mm gun has little physical effect on the large forts it had a tremendous psychological effect on the personnel and caused the enemy to surrender in droves.

resistance before the 3rd Infantry Division collapsed and the Battalion moved with the Division to the approaches of the RHINE VALLEY where it assembled in preparation for the crossing of the RHINE RIVER. On the 26th of March 1945 the Division forced a crossing of the RHINE RIVER in the vicinity of WORMS. At this time the companies of the Battalion moved to direct fire positions on the bank of the River and gave their respective Regiments direct fire on known enemy positions and observation posts. Upon completion of the bridges over the River the companies moved to their regimental areas and supported them in the attack due EAST into greater GERMANY.

of the RIFINE had apparently collapsed and only small pockets of

resistance WEST of the RHINE could be found. During this time the guns of the Battalion followed along with the Infantry giving direct fire support on any enemy strong points or road blocks that was holding up the advance of the troops. Little firing was done at this time because available targets were few and insignificant and generally taken care of by the Infantry.

(b) ENEMY OPERATIONS FOR THE PERIOD.

On the 15th of March the Battalion again entered the line with the 3rd Infantry Division south of ZWEIBRUCKEN in the Seventh Army's attack on the Siegfried Lines. The front in this sector had been static for three months and the enemy had taken advantage of the interval to strengthen his defenses with well-placed minefields and further entrenchments, which, with the belts of concrete "dragons" teeth and the system of pillboxes constructed previously, formed a very strong line. These positions were defended stubbornly by a comparatively light enemy force. The attack toward ZWEIBRUCKEN proceeded rather slowly once the actual fortifications were reached, but after the Third Army made a thrust south to KAISERSLAUTERN at the defenders rear they attempted to withdraw. By then it was too late and the racing columns of friendly armore and infantry from both south and north swiftly cut them off from retreat back across the The force thus captured had apparently counted largely in the defensive plans of the German High Command and as a consequence they had very little to oppose the Allied crossing of the RHINE and the attack EAST from there. The enemy withdrew his very sparse force through the Odenwald fighting a few scattered delaying actions enroute and this procedure was continuing at the end of the period.


Regarding the enemy action directly affecting this Battalion, in the initial phase the attack on the border fortification of the SIEGFRIED LINES the minefields immobilized three of our destroyers and proved the most effective means the enemy had of hindering the advance of our armor. In addition to this enemy artillery succeeded in disabling two of our tank destroyers. Due to the dearth of enemy armor they did not attempt any direct engagement with our M-36's. During the latter part of the period one of our armed reconnaissance cars (M-8) while spearheading the advance was trapped by an enemy tank and immobilized.

One of the main deterrents to the advance of our TD's in this present campaign has been the crossings of the RHINE and MAIN Rivers. The Germans exploited these natural obstacles to the utmost by blowing up the bridges. It was then necessary to ferry the armor across until bridges were constructed. This was a slow and tedious process slowing up the advance of the Infantry due to the lack of supporting armor in the interim of crossing.

(c) SITUATION AT END OF PERIOD.

The Battalion was in sup ort of the 3rd Infantry Division with each company in support of its respective Regiment. All companies had crossed the MAIN River at Worth (NO25340) and were supporting their Regiments on a drive Northeast toward Lohr (N314465). No strong organized resistance had been met and the tank destroyers of the Battalion moved along with the Infantry giving direct firs support

on small pockets of enemy resistance.



At the beginning of the period the Battalion was eighteen men understrength. The day prior to the beginning of the period nineteen general reinforcements, enlisted men, were received. Excluding two medical aid men, these men were all Armored Force trainees sent from the states two weeks before. Although none of these men were basically trained in the operation of tank destroyers, they were all young and alert and seemed to have the proper spirit and will to fight. It is thought that they will become good crew men with experience. Two new TD officers were also assigned to the Battalion during this period bringing the officers strength to T/O, but the four additional authorized overstrength has not been reached although requisitions have been submitted. At the close of the period the Battalion was thirtyfive men understrength - the difference being due to men hospitalized for sickness and battle casualties. This unit is in great need of these men, having three destroyers temporally immobilized due to lack of trained craws. Most of the above casualties and hospitalized men are destroyer crew men. This shortage of personnel has been requisitioned and all possible means are being exploited to excedite the procurement of these men as soon as possible.

Prior to the present operation the Battalion received the new M-36 tank destroyer in place of the M-10 tank destroyer, and went into combat with this weapon for the first time on 15 March 1945. During this period 3 tank destroyers were disabled by mines and 2 by artillery fire, but only 2 were totally lost. These tank destroyers were replaced almost immediately and the mes damaged have been repaired and are now in operation.

(a) COMMENT AND LESSONS LEARNED.

- 1. During the training period carried in the first 2 weeks of the month a number of experiments were carried on which may be of interest to other units.
- (a) The succes of using sand bags on tanks as a protection against bazooka fire was tested. The front of a Tiger Royal tank was sanbagged (1 sandbag thick) and a German Panzerfaust was fired against the sandbags. The resulant effect was a hole burned into the armor approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ " wide and $\frac{1}{4}$ " deep. The Panzerfaust was again exploded on the frontal plate of the tank with out the protection of sandbags and a hole approximately 3/4" wide and $6\frac{1}{4}$ " deep was burned into the armour plate.
- (b) The 90mm gun was tested by firing at a Tiger Royal tank at a range of 1000 yards both frontally and from the flank. Six rounds were fired at the front plate, all rounds ricocheted off gouging out large pieces of metal. Six rounds were then fired from the flank at 1000 yards and shots penetrated both the turret and the hull. These rounds fired were the normal APCBD shell with muzzle velocity of 2750 f/s.
- (c) A test of direct-firing at night using both searchlights and 60mm flares was carried on during the training period. The use of

searchlights for night firing was found to be impractical while the flares proved to be the ideal medium. Since the searchlight must seek a certain amount of defilade for its own protection the only light received on the target area is reflected light which doesn't give the gunner sufficient light to adjust his sights. The flare however, bursting directly over the impact area, provides enough illumination to fire at the target. When the Infantry Regiments of the 3rd Infantry Division crossed the RHINE the flare method on night firing as used by one company with excellent success. Enemy observation towers 800 yards from the guns and enemy held houses 1000 yards from the guns were either completely destroyed or rendered untenable.

- (d) It is highly recommended by this organization that larger allotments of amminition be allocated to TD Battalions during training periods so that new and improved methods of firing may be tried out before the unit moves back into combat.
- 2. In the assault of the SIEGFRIED LINE the HVAP shell was tested against pillboxes and found to be very successful. It was found that two or three rounds of high velocity ammunition had the same effect as 6 or 8 rounds of normal velocity ammunition. However the extreme shortage of this type of ammunition made it impossible to use it as desired. Consequently during the firing on pillboxes the HE (delay fuse) was used and proved to be the second best type of ammunition available for this mission.
