- 5. OUR OPERATIONS FOR THE PERIOD: (a)

(1) Debarked from troop transport on the 6th February 1944. Period from 1st February 1944 to time of debarkation was spent in detailed duties aboard transport. Arrived at present station on the 7th February 1944.

(2) Time from the 7th February 1944 was spent in setting up the camp and housekeeping; including the drawing of available equipment & indoctrination.

(3) From 14th February 1944 to 19 February 1944, training schedule included basic subjects as persoribed in TM 35, 1st T.D. Brigade dated 13th February 1944.

- (4) The week from 21 February 1944 to 26 February 1944, was spent in back and primary subjects, stress being put on a class in m nes and booby traps working with actual enemy mines. Receipt of our T/E vehicles enabled us to a certain extent to review most of the primary subjects. Time was also spent during this week in preparing for the following week's schedule of our secondary mission as reinforcing artillery with interest firing.
- (5) The 28th and 29th of February 1944were spent beginning the Field Artillery training as laid down by TM #6, lst T.D. Brigade. Time not spent on the actual F.A. training was spent on Motor Maintenance and physical conditioning.
- (1) Factors beyond control: (a) To date the only factors beyond our control have been the issuance of equipment, and the necessity of providing an extremely large came detail. These two factors have effected our training materially, but are now being remedied to a certain extent. Although we have all of our M-10's, M-8's, and most of our other vehicles, we are greatly hempered in our present Field circles and the necessary equipment for the fire direction teams. Also, we do not have our recovery vehicles, which impedes our training to a certain extent. At the per each firing company, and only one siming circle per company. We have also experienced a great deal of difficulty in obtaining the necessary equipment for pre-

(c) The date this unit will be ready for operations will be 1 April 1946, pending the receipt of equipment which we are now short.

(2) Combat Efficiency:

a. The battalion as a whole is satisfactory for performing their primery mission, pending receipt of initial shortages and shortages not received as a part of the initial issue of major units.

b. Companies A, B & C (Firing companies) are at the present time unsertisfactory for performing their secondary mission as reinforcing artillery. However, the present training schedule covering indirect firing will be concluded 31 March 1944 or there abouts. Providing the necessary facilities are at our disposal for this training, battalion will have a rating of satisfactory for their secondary mission.

Our Operations for the Period: (a) From the first to the seventeenth of the month, we were at our base came in Packington Park. Per TH #10, 1st TD Brigade, we started an intensive training schedule in our secondary mission, as laid down by WDC #125, 1943. For this seventeen day period, half of our training time was alloted to Field Artillery, one-quarter of the time to physical conditioning, and the other one-quarter to care and cleaning of our equipment (including motor maint-

(b) On the seventeenth of the month, we made a motor movement to the Brecon Beacon Range Area in South Wales. After two days spent establishing camp, service practice firing was started on the 20th. Since we had but 12 of our 36 destroyers equipped with the proper sights, the Company platoons rotated daily on the guns. The first week, 20th to the 27th we fired axial precision, bracket, and FO methods, Observed Fire. Firing positions were changed and we had a night preparation of The platoons not occupied with the Field Artillery firing, were occupied on problems in our primary mission and dismounted work. Platoons were rotated daily. Reconnaissance Company was engaged in mounted work, bridge estimation, map reading, compass work, and road conditioning. From the 27th to the 31st, one firing company at a time was given the entire twelve guns and had exercises in prearranged unobserved. fire. Registration by either FO or axial methods (observed), firing to check points, and firing unobserved concentrations. (Actually observed to determine accuracy). During this period, we were given a test ty 6th Tank Destroyer Group to determine our efficiency in our secondary mission. Reconnaissance Company also fired their M-8s, direct fire, and the co-axially mounted .30 Caliber Machine Guns. Units not engaged in firing were occupied with problems in our primary mission plus dismounted work. During the entire period at the Brecon Beacons range the following amount of amount tion was expended: 1944 round (ME) 3"; 300 rounds 37mm (HE) and 6000 rounds of .30 caliber ball.

6. Combat Efficiency: (a) The status of training of this unit has been greatly enhanced by this last period of training and we feel, that the combat efficiency has been definitely increased.

(b) The only factor beyond our control has been the lack of our TE equipment. However, we have gotten quite a bit of equipment over what we had last month. Around the middle of our indirect firing program, we were given the Azimuth Indicators, to take the place of the panoramic sights; this did not seem, how ever, to decrease the efficiency of our firing.

(c) Due to the fact that we only have about 60% of our equipment at the present time, we are not ready for combat. With our TE equipment we would be ready for combat.

7. We have had no operations during this period.

- OUR OPERATIONS FOR THE PERIOD: (a)

(1) On the 2nd of the month, we returned from Firing Field Artillery Indirect

Problems in South Wales, by motor convoy.

- (2) The 3rd of April was spent on Care & Cleaning of equipment. The following three days was spent in training with small arms, preliminary marksmanship, Com-pany Field Artillery problems, and radio procedure. The 7th and 8th, we had showdown inspections, by Company, to determine shortiges and condition of equipment, On the afternoon of the 8th, we were informed by the 6th Tank Destroyer Group Commander that we had been selected to maintain Marshalling Camps in the South of England. On this date, our training as a tactical Bettalion ceased.
- (3) The Battalion moved out of base Camp, Camp #5, Packington Park, by a combined rail and motor movement on the 10th and 11th of April 1944. Destination was Dorchester.
- Upon arrival of destination, the Battalion was split up into three groups. each group to maintain one marshalling camp. Battalion Headquarters was designated as Sub-Area "I", in Area "D",

(1) Factors Beyond Our Control: (a) Present assignment of the Battalion. (b) There has been no assault training given

to this unit.

OUR OPERATIONS FOR THE PERIOD: (a)

(1) This entire period has been spent on maintaining and running Marshalling

Camps in the Southern Section of England.

(2) The Battalion has been made responsible for Sub-Area "X" in Marshalling Area "D". There are three camps in Sub-Area "X". Companies Hq. & "B" are running Camp D-75. Company "A" is running D-7P; Reconnaissance and Company "O" are running Camp D-4. All units have a number of attached troops to aid in the running of these Camps.

(3) There has been no formal training given this unit, but we have managed to work in about two hours of 3" firing, small arms and 37 mm firing against moving targets. Officer's schools have been held, from four to five hours each week; schools

covered indirect firing, Foreign Map reading, and 81mm Mortar.

(4) The Battalion Rear Echelon consisting of 36 M-10s, 3 T-2s Recovery, were moved from Packington Park to Lytchett Minister to facilitate our future training period.
