## WPAF CT: Monthly Operational Report

TO : The Adjutant General,  
Headquarters, U. S. Army.

FOLLOWING are operations of 644th Tank Destroyer Battalion  
for month of October 1944.

1. 1 October 1944, 644th Tp Bn, less Co's A and B, was attached to CT 13 by CO #13, HQ 8th Inf Div, Ctd 1 Oct 44. HQ Co relieved tank force "X" and took up duties patrolling that portion of division sector between 13th Inf Reg't and 2nd Bn of 28th Inf Reg't. Contact with friendly units on either flank was maintained. HQ Co CP moved to vicinity of VILLEUR (740655). Pcs CP and Co C moved to vicinity of VILLEUR (740655) and then to CHAVAX (770631). Co C was assigned mission of setting up defensive positions within Co C sector. Concurrent with the CP movements of this unit the tank track vehicles arrived by train and were dispatched to Sects A, B, and C.

2. On 13 further attachment Co A to CT 13, which relieved CCB of 5th Armored Division. Co A moved to vicinity of CHAVAX (711377) and occupied defensive positions to support CT 13. During this period Co A fired indirect harassing fire on enemy fortifications and personnel in the Siegfried Line.

3. Co B was attached to CT 13, which relieved 108th Inf of the 8th Division. Co CP moved to vicinity of LIEGE (840702) and occupied defensive positions in support of CT 13. 1st and 2nd platoons of Co B took up positions in a salient which extends the Siegfried Line eastward.

4. 6 October 1944, 644th Tp Bn, less Co's A, B, C, and HQ, was released from attachment to CT 13 and became attached to 8th Div Arty. HQ CP group moved to BOVANS (710643) and there consolidated with the 7th Regt CP.

5. 31 October, Co C moved to LIEGE (730670) and continued holding position on their sector. Direct and indirect fire missions were fired at enemy defensive fortifications and personnel.

6. When Co C was released from attachment to CT 13 by CO #14, HQ 8th Inf Div and returned to HQ control on 24 October 1944. HQ CP moved to vicinity AUSSEZON (710643).

7. Its Co. 644th Td Bn, was organized into 8th Company, provisional in which was formed by 8th Infantry Division for planned defense of STIME. Provisional Company consists of sixty (60) EM and five (5) Officers.

8. Two (2) EM, this unit, were awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action. Fourteen (14) Officers and nine (9) received the Bronze Star award. Decorations were awarded during month of October for achievements since 1<sup>st</sup> July 1944.

9. On 11 October 1944, two EM of this battalion, Philip A DiCarlo, 34850710 and Owen Roe McCormick, 32001950, received Commissions as Officers of U S Army and were reassigned to 8th as 2nd Lt.

relieving elements of the 23 INF DIV (109 Inf) prior to 030600A October 1944, will hold in strength its portion of the Div sector (Annex No 1). CT12 will maintain contact with 2 INF DIV on its left.

b. CT121 (less 3d Bn on TD Bn)

At 01: Co A 644 TD Bn  
relieving elements of the 5 ARMD DIV (002) after daylight 2 Oct. 1944, will hold in strength its portion of the Div sector (Annex No 1). CT121 will maintain contact with THIRD ARMY (33 Inf Div) on its right, and protect the Div right flank.

c. CT28

At 01: 644 TD Bn (less Cos A&B)  
Co D 709 FA Bn  
8 Ron Tr

will assemble in area as shown on overlay (Annex No 1) prior to 021200A Oct 1944. CT28 will relieve patrols of the 5 ARMD DIV (002) and "X" of 23 INF DIV in its sector prior to 020600A Oct 1944, and will maintain aggressive patrolling in its portion of the Div Sector keeping contact with CT13 on the left (North) and CT121 on the right (South). One Bn will be prepared to move by motor to any portion of the Div sector on orders from this HQ. CT28 will be prepared to defend with not less than two Bns, any two of the numbered centers of resistance shown on overlay (Annex No 1). Each such center of resistance will be reconnoitered and prepared for defense, but will not be occupied or defended without orders from this HQ. Routes to each center of resistance, from the CT assembly area, and between centers of resistance will be reconnoitered and plainly marked for use by day or night.

MOVEMENT OF TRACK VEHICLES FROM LANDERNEAU, BRITTANY TO LUXEMBURG

## 1. 26th September 1944:

0800 - Departed from Battalion Motor Park with Companies "A", "B", "C" (thirty-four (34) M-10s and two (2) T-2s) for Landernau Station. Weather cloudy and drizzling.

0900 - Column closed at Landernau Station

1100 - Began loading flat cars.

2230 - Completed loading flat cars except two (2) replacement M-10s. The delay in loading was due to the railroad and RTO placing cars at very slow intervals. Loading went well and all ~~men~~ did an excellent job.

## 2. 27th September 1944:

0830 - Two (2) flat cars prepared and waiting for Lt OWEN to arrive with replacement M-10s.

1000 - Lt OWEN arrived at Landernau Station with two (2) replacement M-10s ("A" and "B" Company's).

1300 - Vehicles checked and loaded (two (2) M-10s).

1300 - Lt OWEN left Landernau Station with 2-1/2 ton truck to join wheeled column.

1300 - Conference held with all officers by Major GANTON and the balance of time at Landernau is to be used for care and cleaning of materiel, personal equipment, check loading and improve where necessary. The safety regulations for the trip were issued at this time.

2300 - The trains were organized for the trip.

Train #1 - One (1) coach, twenty (20) flats (thirteen (13), "A" and seven (7), "C"), one (1) boxcar, one (1) caboose - four (4) officers, one hundred and four (104) enlisted men.

Major GANTON - Train Commander

Telephone communication with each car.

Train #2 - One (1) coach, nineteen (19) flats (thirteen (13), "B" and six (6), "C"), one (1) boxcar, one (1) caboose - five (5) officers, one hundred and three (103) enlisted men.

Captain McDONALD - Train Commander

Telephone communication with each car.

## 3. 28th September 1944:

1000 - Trains #1 and #2 still lined up and we are awaiting further instructions regarding movement. Weather is clear and morale excellent.

1100 - Informed of departure time.

Train #1 - 0720, 29 September 1944.

Train #2 - 1120, 29 September 1944.

1115 - All officers notified of departure schedule.

## 4. 29th September 1944 - Train #1 - Major EDWARD R GANTON, Train Comdr.

0800 - Train #1 left Landernau Station. RTO has still not given us any sort of running schedule, etc., although we tried many times to get one.

1310 - Arrived St Brieuc. Water and latrine facilities.

1420 - Left St Brieuc.

1635 - Arrived Rennes. Water and latrine facilities. RTO still has no schedule or destination for us.

1705 - Left Rennes

2320 - Arrived Le Mans. Water and latrine facilities. RTO had doughnuts for all men. RTO very cooperative but still no schedule.

5. 30th September 1944:

0130 - Left Le Mans.

0830 - Arrived Chartres. Weather clear and cool; morale excellent.

0945 - Left Chartres. All equipment, etc, riding OK.

1715 - Arrived Dreux. The past four (4) hours have been slow traveling due to heavy railroad traffic.

1910 - Left Dreux.

6. 1st October 1944:

0730 - Arrived Versailles. Very slow traveling from Dreux to here due to train wreck and lack of sufficient locomotive power.

0845 - Left Versailles.

0945 - Arrived Paris. Weather clear; morale excellent. Received information at this point that we are going to Verdun. Can get no information as to length of stop, route, etc.

1745 - Traveling is very slow.

7. 2nd October 1944:

1130 - Arrived Sceaux. Weather cloudy and cold; morale excellent.

1220 - Left Sceaux.

1745 - Arrived Sommescoue. Issued one hundred and ten (110) K rations. Water and latrine facilities.

1845 - Left Sommescoue.

8. 3rd October 1944:

1310 - Arrived at Verdun. One and one half (1-1/2) hour stop. Men washed, shaved, etc. Water and latrine facilities. Weather clear and cool.

1450 - Left Verdun.

1630 - Arrived Conflans Jarry.

1700 - Left Conflans Jarry.

1830 - Arrived Longuon. Met by Lt STEVENSON who informed us that we would continue by rail to Bastogne, Belgium.

1845 - Left Longuon. Lt STEVENSON will meet us at Bastogne and do all possible to make arrangements for unloading.

1940 - Delayed in mountains. One (1) engine cannot make the grade. Have telephoned for a second engine.

2015 - Second engine arrived and we are continuing our trip.

2145 - Arrived Longivy. Replacement of French engine with Belgian engine.

2215 - Left Longivy.

9. 4th October 1944:

0900 - Arrived Libramont, Belgium. Weather clear and cold; morale excellent.

0925 - Left Libramont.

1330 - Arrived Bastogne.

1400 - Starting to unload.

1545 - Completed unloading.



- 1600 - Started road march to Battalion Area.  
 1645 - "C" Company's remaining track vehicles (7) being taken to battalion assembly area near Wilts, Luxembourg.  
 1645 - Captain McDUGAL guiding "A" Company track vehicles to their area.  
 1730 - Arrived at Battalion assembly area. "C" Company's seven (7) vehicles and personnel bivouacing in this area overnight and will be met by Commanding Officer, Company "C", tomorrow morning.

10. Train #2 - Captain LESLIE P McDUGAL Train Commander.

11. 29th September 1944:

- 1139 - Left Landerneau.  
 1304 - Arrived Morlaix.  
 1315 - Left Morlaix.  
 1700 - Arrived Guingamp.  
 1735 - Left Guingamp.  
 1914 - Arrived St Brieuc.  
 1925 - Left St Brieuc.

Private Hayes, 1st Platoon, Company "B", was in latrine at station and did not hear train whistle - was left behind.

2255 - Arrived Rennes - got water and used latrine facilities. Reported loss of Hayes to RTG and was informed that he had turned himself into MPs at St Brieuc who sent him to Rennes. He rejoined train at Rennes. RTG at Rennes had no papers or itinerary for Train Commander.

12. 30th September 1944:

0001 - Left Rennes at 2340, 29th September 1944. Train OK. All M-10s and personnel in good shape.

0400 - Arrived at Le Mans. Had to put three (3) PWI men out of cabooses; left immediately.

1234 - Arrived Chartres - drew water and one (1) day of C Rations for one hundred and six (106). Latrines available.

1400 - Left Chartres.

1655 - Arrived Melun. RTG asked for papers which train Commander did not have.

1705 - Left Melun.

1840 - Arrived Sezanne. RTG gave destination as Longuen. Said it might take two (2) days to get there. Drew two (2) days C Ration for one hundred and six (106).

1950 - Left Sezanne.

2230 - Arrived Bar-le-Duc. Water and latrine facilities.

2252 - Left Bar-le-Duc.

13. 1st October 1944:

0100 - Passed through Verdun.

0600 - Arrived Longuen. RTG said member of train crew (French) had seen a man fall off during night. Cpl Tremblay, Company "B", missing. Returned 1600.

0700 - Began unloading.

0830 - Unloading finished. Ordered by Lt Colonel KUNZIG to go into bivouac and await train #1.

1800 - Lt HOFFER and Lt STEVENSON arrived in Longuen with instructions. Prepared to move tracks to vicinity of Wilts, Luxembourg.

14. 2nd October 1944

0800 - Tracks moved to bivouac at Wilts. Arrived at 1100.  
1500 - Reported to Lt Colonel GRAHAM.

REMARKS (Trains #1 and #2):

1. Loading of equipment by all companies on flat cars was done in an excellent manner and without incident.
2. Placing of flat cars beside ramp by the PTO and railroad personnel at Landerneau was exceptionally slow. This condition delayed the completion of our loading many hours.
3. No personnel or vehicles were lost or damaged enroute.
4. Lt STEVENSON's careful planning and coordination expedited the unloading and movement of vehicles to their respective areas in Luxemburg.
5. The personnel of both trains performed all tasks in an excellent manner and morale was excellent during the entire train trip which was long and not too comfortable at times.

SUBJECT: Report on Dispositions of Ron Company, 6th TD Bn

TO : CO, 28th Infantry Regiment

1. Strong Points and Outposts

a) NEUTRACHEN (820673)

1. Garrison: 1st Ron platoon with strength of 22 men, 1 officer, six (6) M1 from Pioneer platoon and 2 81 mm Mortars.

2. Disposition: (a) Strong point on South edge of village.

All around wire (barbed) is planned based on houses and digging in.

(b) Outpost of 6 men and 1 radio on

NEUTRACHEN - KÄRPERN road in a house.

3. Contact: (a) Every two (2) hours on the even hour w/13th Infantry Service Company at P.J. (815652) by patrol from III Ron Platoon.

(b) Every hour on 15 minutes before the hour by radio to company Headquarters.

b) HILL 532 (815658)

1. Garrison: 3rd Ron Platoon with strength of 22 men, 1 officer, six (6) M1 from Pioneer Platoon and 2 81 mm Mortars.

2. Disposition: Strongpoint on Hill both sides of Highway 16. Plan all around wire based on small knoll and grove.

3. Contact: Every two (2) hours a patrol from this place will contact the strong points at NEUTRACHEN AND TISBACH.

c) TISBACH (808653)

1. Garrison: 2d Ron Platoon; strength 22 men, and 1 officer.

2. Disposition: Outpost of 1 section on each side of P.J.

(808653)

3. Contact: (a) with 3rd Ron Platoon as above.

(b) with 1st Company elements, 28th Infantry at MARIA (807631). 28th Infantry machine guns at that place. Contact every two hours. (approximately)

d) C.R. TISBACH where Tank Force X had bivouac (791653).
