STOUMONT ACTION

"A" Co, less the and Platoon and Maintenance section, attached to the 3rd Battalion, 119th Infantry, entered STOUMONT, BELGIUM, about 181800 Dec 44. At that time through the evening darkness the cat-eye lights of an unknown quantity of enemy armor was observed and their meter purred about 1200 yards South East of the tewn. Immediate reconnaissance for gun positions was made and the 2 platoens, the first under Lt THOMAS SPRINGFIELD and the 3rd under Lt MARD JACOBSON, went into positions East, South and West of town as shown by attached everlay. Two belts of mines were laid in a hasty field by the Infantry on the road leading to Lt GLEIZE as indicated on the everlay.

At approximately 2300 the Germans sent a small vehicle West toward our lines along the main read leading into STOUMONT! It advanced almost as far as the first mine field, halted and then withdrew without suffering any damages. At about 0230 the morning of 19 Dec 44 the same manuever was attempted but this time the vehicle, a jeep, hit a mine and was destroyed.

About 0500 German armor, led by a Mk V tank and infantry launched a determind attack on STOUMONT. The early worning darkness was intensified by a heavy fog which made it impossible to see through the telescopic sights in the towed 3" guns. Although a request was made of the infantry for morter flares to assist observation at sighting targets, this re west was denied. With foot troops the lead tank moved along the main highway leadin to STOUMONT ustil it reached the first mise barrier at which time the tank personnel with the aid of flashlights removed first mines. Private Sanchez threw a hand grand at these Germans and their return fire from automatic weapons drove Pvt Brinkoetter from the 30 Cal MG with which he was about to open fire, wounding him slightly. The tank them moved through the mines flanking No.1 gum on its right and so the gum could not fire on the tank or move to positions from which it could fire, the crew was ferced to withdraw. The tank continued its advance, turning off the read to the North, then driving West parallel to the main highway until No. 2 gus was flanked and its crew forced to retire. At this time No. 3 gus adjusted its position so that it could cover the main road junction and No. 5 moved to the alternate position shown on the overlay marked "A" where it covered the North branck of the highway and road junction. The Mk V returned to the highway and moved slowly west until it reached the read junction, where it was fired upon Nr. 3 gun. No damage to the tank was done as all shots ricocheted off the front of the glacier plate. The tank then spened up with MG and 75mm HE knocking out the 3" gum. At about 0730 with light conditions improving the tank edged forward and came within range of No. 5 gum and a 90mm AM gun on the right flank. Both opened fire at the same time and the tank burned.

By this time enemy armor had left the main highway and was attempting to flank the town from the South and North. Enemy

infantry small arms fire upon No. 4 gun and crew forced the crew to withdraw. No. 6 gun became engaged in a fire fight and after holding infantry off for some time with small arms fire the Germann tank suddently appeared around the South West corner of the cementary and knocked out the 3" gun with HE. This tank them continued West between guns No. 6 & 7 automatically flanking and coming into the rear of 7 & 8 guns which were unable to swing arround for their protection.

During the action fire from tanks and large calibre assault guns had been moderate. After all guns had been neutralized and friendly infantry was withdrawing from the town at about 0930, instructions were given to withdraw in all vehicles that could be removed.
