When I went to the first field hospital from Bastogne, I was told by Capt. Lampert (Med. Officer) that Petrie was there with one leg off and Edgar with both legs off. I am not sure when Hamilton was injured but I know that we were all Company Commanders at the time and all of us were in the hospital from wounds at Bastogne. I don't know if you have seen or heard about the book that Edgar's wife Betsy wrote about their life with the wheel chair. It is a very well written book and I have it here somewhere.
